


EDITORIAL

there are now over 1200 New Testament churches planted among some of the world's most remote people groups. We took time to pray for the ongoing work that the Lord is doing through His people serving throughout the world, and praised Him for His unwavering faithfulness over the last seventy-five years, knowing He will remain faithful in the years ahead. Then we celebrated 'British style' with a traditional 'afternoon tea', enjoying tea, coffee, sandwiches, cakes and scones!



On the 28th April 2017, NTM-USA ANNOUNCED THAT IT WAS CHANGING ITS NAME FROM NEW TRIBES MISSION TO ETHNOS360. It was a decision taken after years of consideration and planning. NTM-UK has no immediate thoughts about a name change in the United Kingdom. WE WILL REMAIN KNOWN AS NEW TRIBES MISSION.



NORTH COTES UPDATE

After spending two years talking and praying through things with our home church in Shephed, we started the first year Biblical Studies course in September 2015, and are now nearing the end of the second year's Cross Cultural Communications course. The course has been **FANTASTIC, INTERESTING, THOUGHT-PROVOKING, CHALLENGING,** and above all useful, in helping us to become relevant in a cross-cultural context.



CÔTE D'IVOIRE THE REAL STORY

During the last two weeks of May, our team of eight had the privilege of going out to Ivory Coast to assist the young Palaka church in constructing a building where they could meet for worship, regardless of the weather. Previously they had been meeting in the shade of a couple of huge mango trees.

We were hosted by a couple, who are the only NTM missionaries living amongst the Palaka people. Amidst other things, they are working on the translation of the New Testament into the Palaka language. This great task is well on its way to completion.

It became clear early in our time there that **THE REAL STORY WAS NOT ABOUT THE CHURCH BUILDING** that we had come to put a roof on, **BUT RATHER THE CHURCH THAT GOD IS BUILDING AMONGST THESE DEAR PALAKA PEOPLE.** The two Sundays that we had the privilege of worshipping with them were a special blessing.

TO SEE THEIR FAITH, THEIR LOVE FOR THE LORD AND FOR THE WORD OF GOD, WAS A JOY TO US ALL.

During each Sunday service, an opportunity is given for individuals to recount what they learnt from the message of the previous week. As various ones shared (interpreted by our hosts) it was obvious that they had come eager to learn from the Word. Indeed their sincere faith is known far and wide in this area of the country.

In very difficult circumstances we were able to accomplish almost everything that we set out to do. In the end our time ran out, but we left the building at a point where it can be easily finished. I do not recall ever being involved in a project where I was so aware of so many people praying for us. It was apparent that God was present, giving us strength daily.

It is reassuring to know that this building will be a venue where people meet to the glory of God, for many years to come.

The Palaka Christians appreciated all who contributed to this project. They kept saying with amazement, "people who don't even know us are helping us". What a great testimony to them of the body of Christ in action. We were blessed to go on this trip and be part of a great venture. We add our heartfelt thanks to those of the Palaka Christians.

PAPUA NEW GUINEA HIS VESSELS

In 1997 we moved by helicopter into Sorimi. This was in answer to their plea for help as they were, "dying like pigs and dogs because no one cared about them." Twenty years later, we are thankful to still be involved with the Sorimi people. Now, many names are known and numbered in the Book of Life!

We learned their language and culture, taught literacy, and gave medical care; developing great friendships to share the love of Christ. Bible translation began while teaching key passages from creation to His resurrection. A Sorimi church was born in 2007! **WHAT JOY TO SEE CHANGES FROM FEAR TO FAITH, RITUALS TO PRAYING, AND BELIEVERS COMMITTED TO HELP WITH TRANSLATION AND TEACHING IN CHURCH.**

Four years ago we had to leave Sorimi, but remained burdened for the maturing church. God began to unfold a plan! Poul now works in the UK translating what he can independently. Portions of Scripture are at various stages: from his first draft to implementing corrections made by Sorimi people, or preparing final work for checking with a consultant. After editing, more Scripture is printed and sent to the church! Aside from translation, Poul also prepares Bible lessons to teach to the church.



POUL & CAROL JOENSEN have three sons. Poul is Faroese and Carol is British. In 2014 they returned to UK for the boys' British educational needs, Poul continues in itinerant work with the Sorimi church.

Every six months, he takes a six week trip to Sorimi, teaching lessons, meeting with leaders guiding them in shepherding the church, and working with translation helpers. They add detail to his first draft, then read it to first-time listeners to ensure they can comprehend. Yearly, Poul and three Sorimi men have a final check with a mission consultant regarding accuracy and clarity of the Sorimi Scripture.

This involves being on the move, leaving family, many expenses, a less systematic way of translating, and not keeping in tune with the church to know how best to disciple them during a short trip. But God enables! For the sake of the Gospel, we continue as a TEAM; our family, supporters, Sorimi workers and others. What a privilege to be His vessels! To GOD be the glory... the Sorimi people no longer fear death because they have eternal life!



SOUTHEAST ASIA CREATING OPPORTUNITIES

Recently I read an article by a photographer who referred to himself as being 'location independent', preferring to move from assignment to assignment. Many others have adopted this 'digital nomad' lifestyle. In today's world of internet based work and digital communication **CAN THE WORK OF MISSIONS BE CARRIED ON REMOTELY?** If so, what can and cannot be achieved this way?

There are two important elements in the work of cross-cultural mission; time and proximity. Time spent with the people, learning language and culture, building friendships and relationships, time in evangelism, teaching and discipleship. **CHURCH PLANTING CAN TAKE YEARS OF INVESTING IN PEOPLE'S LIVES, LIVING IN THEIR COMMUNITIES.**

There are some roles however, that can be fulfilled on an itinerant basis. Our own personal circumstances have caused us to be away from the field a lot over recent years. With the task of researching ethnic people groups in Asia we have carried out much of this assignment using email and internet. However, more in-depth research must follow with onsite visits and assessments.



In countries where access is restricted it is usually not possible to have a long-term, settled ministry in one place. However, it may be possible to make short visits to these locations, connecting with the people in different places, training and equipping others to go where we cannot. The context of these ministry locations demands that we find alternative ways of working, including working itinerantly.

Speaking to His disciples, Jesus said, "Foxes have holes and birds of the air have nests but the Son of man has no place to lay His head." Jesus had nothing against having a roof over His head but He didn't want His followers to be restricted by such temporary things as housing or location. Globalisation, urbanisation and technology have opened up different possibilities for reaching people that were not possible before. **WE MUST AVAIL OURSELVES OF EVERY OPPORTUNITY TO REACH THE UNREACHED PEOPLES OF OUR DAY.**

PAPUA NEW GUINEA BUILDING HIS CHURCH

In 1995 we started to work in the Yagwoia tribe in the Highlands of Papua New Guinea. Right from the beginning of the work it was **OUR GOAL TO WORK HARD TO REACH THE PEOPLE IN THE YAGWOIA TRIBE WITH GOD'S WORD IN THEIR OWN CULTURE AND LANGUAGE.** Once people in the tribe put their trust in Christ for salvation and started to meet as Christians it was our goal to train them so that they would be able to continue the work of teaching the believers and reaching out to the unbelievers.

The believers at the different locations in the tribe grew in their faith in the Lord as we were teaching them and the Holy Spirit was working in their hearts. They were able to take over more and more responsibilities in the churches and in outreach.

We also continued translating God's Word and in 2009 **WE WERE ABLE TO GIVE THE BELIEVERS THE NEW TESTAMENT IN THEIR LANGUAGE.** At that time we moved to another part of the tribe where we started to work among Yagwoia people speaking other dialects. We began to adapt the translation and Bible lessons to those dialects. Meanwhile four times a year we visited the believers where we used to live.

In 2012 we moved to the Netherlands to help our children adjust to life in Europe and to help my elderly parents. We continue to work on Old Testament translation and adapting translation and Bible lessons for the dialects.

Yearly we visit the different locations in the tribe during the summer months.

We check the translated material with the believers and work on the dialect changes. Each year we enjoy seeing that the Lord continues to build His church in the tribe through the believers.



GREENLAND PICKING UP THE BATON

Óli is Faroese, grew up in Greenland and is married to Anne Sophie, from Switzerland. They lived in Greenland for twelve years and have two daughters; Liljan and Leanna. Over the last two years, they have been through the missionary training at North Cotes College.

"Who would ever want to go to Greenland?" A lady asked us this question recently when we had a display table with information about Greenland, "I am glad you are going, but I prefer warm places", she continued.

WE BELIEVE GOD HAS DIFFERENT PATHS FOR ALL OF US and we know that it is His desire that the Gospel should be preached to all nations and EVEN TO THE ENDS OF THE EARTH. Greenland is one of the far ends of the earth and most people know very little about the country. In conversation with different ones during our missionary training in the UK, the fact that it is a cold place seems to be the only thing most people know about Greenland.

So why would two families who have gone through NTM's missionary training, with special focus on reaching the unreached people groups in the world, go back to Greenland? Approximately 95% of the 55,847 people who live in Greenland are members of the Lutheran State church. They have had a complete Bible translation for more than 100 years, which was revised in the year 2000. So, are they unreached? THE GREENLANDIC PEOPLE HAVE ACCESS TO THE GOSPEL BUT IT HAS ONLY PENETRATED THE HEART OF VERY FEW PEOPLE. The light of true believers walking with the Lord is so limited that it seems like the country is covered with a cloud of spiritual darkness that is so hard to break through.

- Greenland has the highest suicide rate in the world.
- Approximately one out of three people have experienced sexual abuse before the age of eighteen.
- Approximately 20% of all children in Greenland grow up in homes with alcohol problems.



ONLY THE LIGHT OF THE TRUE GOSPEL CAN BREAK THESE VICIOUS CYCLES OF EVIL, HURT AND PAIN.

God has been working for a long time to break the ground and prepare Himself a people who are set free from the slavery of sin in Greenland. Many have gone before us, including missionaries from NTM. It is on the shoulders of those who have worked to prepare the ground that we will stand when we go to continue a task that is unfinished. We pick up the baton from those who ran the race before us.

As we continue the race, it is so important to know what the goal is. We desire to see an indigenous Greenlandic church with ongoing Bible teaching and discipleship in Greenlandic, the heart language of the people. In addition, a church with mature believers and its own leadership, that reach out to all corners of Greenland with the Gospel.

We cannot do this on our own, but nothing is impossible for God. You can be a part of it when you pray for Greenland and for us. God wants His church to function as one body and we will work together with believers in Nuuk, to continue the chronological Bible teaching that is already taking place in Danish.



FILIP & ANE SIVERTSEN
Filip is Faroese, grew up in Greenland and is married to Ane from Denmark. They lived in Greenland for ten years with their two children; Cecilia and Kristian. During the last two years, they have been through the missionary training at North Cotes College.

WE WANT TO TEACH AND DISCIPLE BILINGUAL GREENLANDIC MEN AND WOMEN, AND PASS ON THE BATON TO THEM AS WE WORK WITH THEM TO DEVELOP BIBLE LESSONS IN GREENLANDIC.

Even though we will start Bible teaching in Danish, we shall simultaneously study the Greenlandic language and culture. This is very important for building relationships and being able to disciple the Greenlandic believers more effectively.

VISIT A MISSIONARY?

We left the morning service on a chilly January Sunday to fly from Manchester to the thirty degree heat and hustle and bustle of Dakar. We were on our way to pay a pastoral visit to Steve and Moira Poulson, church members working among the Baynunk people in the southern 'Casamance' region of Senegal. **WE WERE GOING BECAUSE WE WANTED TO ENCOURAGE THEM IN THEIR WORK, BUT ENDED UP BEING ENCOURAGED OURSELVES!**

After two nights in Dakar, we flew down to Ziguinchor. During our time with Steve and Moira, it was wonderful to meet the handful of Baynunk believers whose names we had heard in prayer letters. We travelled on dirt roads to villages where children wear the shirts of European football teams but know nothing of Jesus. **WE SAW THE OPENNESS OF THE PEOPLE TO THE WORD OF GOD** as mp3 recordings of teaching and the Scriptures are being circulated and eagerly listened to on Chinese made battery powered radios. We were also able to worship with African brothers and sisters in a local evangelical church.

We spent five nights with Steve and Moira before flying back to Dakar where we were able to catch up with another church member and talk with members of the West Africa Leadership team.

Graham serves as the pastor of Grimsby Baptist Church. Graham and Cathy travelled to Senegal to visit NTM missionaries in January 2017.

We went to Senegal wanting to encourage and not wanting to get in the way. We were wonderfully welcomed and left with a clear sense that our visit had been an encouragement to the members we visited, and to the wider team because by coming to visit we were taking an interest in what God is doing in West Africa.

So many times during our trip the words of Colossians 1:6 were brought to my mind "All over the world this Gospel is bearing fruit and growing" [NIV] We were reminded again of the power of the Word of God.

We went to Senegal with a desire to encourage but came home encouraged to continue the ongoing Gospel ministry in the United Kingdom.

BEHIND THE SCENES

Ingvard grew up in a Christian home and was saved at the age of 22. Erla also grew up in a Christian home and came to salvation at a young age. Their desire to grow in the knowledge of the Word of God led them both to NTM Bible School in Matlock, Derbyshire in the early 1990's.

They both grew up with the knowledge that there are still unreached people groups, but didn't feel they had what it took to be missionaries. **THROUGH THE TEACHING AT BIBLE SCHOOL THEY REALISED THAT THE LORD IS LOOKING FOR AVAILABILITY.**

Both were convinced that He was leading them to be involved with the Lord's desire expressed in 1 Timothy 2:4 "...who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.". The fact that there are many who still have not heard of Christ's redemptive work on the cross, made them decide to be available.

After several years of waiting they finished the training with NTM in 2000. They served in Venezuela for eight years, working amongst the Yanomami people and at CFM's Bible and Missionary Training Institute. In 2008 they joined the staff team at North Cotes and have been here ever since. Ingvard is one of the resident teachers in the Biblical studies course and Erla is a college secretary.

Ingvard and Erla sometimes ask themselves: Why would the Lord lead them to a country and into a tribal work, to then take them out and place them at North Cotes College?



INGVARD & ERLA PETERSEN

are both from the Faroe Islands and have three children. They served in Venezuela for eight years and joined the staff at North Cotes College in 2008.

What was the purpose of those years in the tribe where they were unable to complete language and cultural learning to a level where they could teach?

THEY MAY NEVER FULLY KNOW THE ANSWERS TO THESE QUESTIONS, BUT THAT IS OKAY!

Moving to more than one new country and learning more than one new language and culture, and coping with living in a remote tribe, has taught them many truths about God and themselves.

Ingvard and Erla count it a privilege to be able to interact through teaching and on a personal level with the students who come and study at the College.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT BEARING FRUIT

In December 2016 a new church was born in Papua New Guinea amongst the Mengen people group. Simon and Annika Flanagan plan to return to this church planting work in 2018, teaming up with their partners, the Laureti family, to see the three existing Mengen churches equipped to reach their own people group and beyond with the Gospel.

Here one new believer shares his testimony:

After growing up not knowing his parents and getting involved with the wrong crowd, he started misusing drugs and alcohol and often got in trouble with the authorities. He fled to a small village far away where he was encouraged by a Mengen Bible teacher, Eddie, to attend literacy classes.

"...They started to teach us God's talk and at first it was really hard for me to listen because I realised who God was. I realised that He was perfect and all powerful and all-knowing and everywhere. HE KNEW ME INSIDE AND OUT, AND I CANNOT HIDE FROM HIM like I'm hiding from the authorities. But then I learned that He is also loving and God is so much different than all the other spirits that we honour and worship. Then I learned about the stupid decision that Adam and Eve made by turning away from this wonderful God. And they actually brought all of us into trouble as well because we are all children from Adam and Eve and we now have the same stomachs (hearts/natures). My stomach was very heavy (concern) as I realised that this perfect God who knows me and sees me, is also the final judge who will judge me and I will definitely go to the fire that has no ending.



SIMON FLANAGAN

Thankfully I heard about the One who would take us back (Redeemer) and would be sent one day as a Helper. So I got to know that Jesus was God Himself who died in my place for my sins. It was just like that perfect innocent Lamb in the Old Testament that was killed and burned in the place of the sinner.

The day I heard about Jesus being the Lamb of God killed in my place to pay for my sins I just could not listen to that anymore. I ran out of the building and found a place where I could hide..."

Eddie says: "As I was teaching I saw him jump up and run out of the building. Afterwards we found him in a ditch crying. He said that he just could not listen to the story anymore. He was just feeling so ashamed and so embarrassed. It was so hard for him to hear that God actually loves him and showed mercy and grace to him and made a plan to help a guy like him, and to believe that God so loves us that He died for us. He felt that he just does not deserve that. After they explained to him that that's exactly why the Gospel is such great news he decided to place his weight on Christ to carry (trust). Today he is growing and training to become a literacy teacher."

Colossians 1:6 "In the same way, the Gospel is bearing fruit and growing throughout the whole world—just as it has been doing among you since the day you heard it and truly understood God's grace."

IMPACT FOR ETERNITY PRAYING FOR ONE ANOTHER

GUINEA- BULONGISH

David and Rachel Burke and their two children, continue serving itinerantly in Guinea, West Africa, whilst living in Northern Ireland. This month (July), they are taking a trip to Guinea, as a family, for three weeks. During their time, they plan to do an outreach to the children in the village and also have the Gospel of John consultant checked. David is working towards completing the translation of the New Testament by the end of 2018. Please continue to pray for the small group of believers to be encouraged and strengthened in their faith. All of the Bulongish villages now have audio Scripture and Bible lessons that they listen to, please pray that the Holy Spirit would open hearts to the truth.

PAPUA NEW GUINEA- ISKI

The Iski church has been born! André and Aurélie Tusch finished the training at North Cotes College in July 2013 and in the same year left their home country of France to serve in a church planting ministry in Papua New Guinea.

They built their home in a remote village and along with team members moved there in 2014.

Together with the Callahan and Williamson families they have studied language and culture and have taught literacy. In February of this year they started teaching the chronological Bible lessons.

The team taught the Iski people every day for three and a half months, ending with a four hour lesson on the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. The Iski heard how Christ's payment satisfied God's judgment of sin and opened the door for them to new life in Him. That afternoon they listened again via digital recordings of the morning lessons.

The next lesson told about Christ going back to Heaven and promising to return again, followed by a time for thoughts from the community. The response was amazing and we have many new brothers and sisters in Christ.

Please pray for the Iski church as the missionaries continue to translate the Scriptures and disciple the believers over the coming years.
